CALIFORNIA COASTAL CLEANUP DAY (CCC) SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 19, 2015 9:00 am to 12 Noon



Every year, on the third Saturday in September, volunteers come together at various sites throughout California to participate in cleaning up and removing trash and recyclables from California's beaches, lakes and waterways. This coastal cleanup event is part of the International Coastal Cleanup, organized by the Ocean Conservancy, which is the largest volunteer event on the planet!

Across California, the CCC is a partnership between the California Coastal Commission, Whole Foods Market, Rubios, non-profit groups, cities, agencies and counties. Locally, cleanups are made possible through the active participation of the cities and counties of Solano and Yolo, the California Coastal Commission, Vallejo Sanitation and Flood Control District, VALCORE Recycling, Recology Vallejo and the Greater Vallejo Recreation District.

So many volunteers join Coastal Cleanup Day events because they want to make beaches, rivers and waterways safe and clean for human use and wildlife habitat. Vast amounts of plastic debris litter the world's oceans causing great harm to birds, whales, fish and other wildlife. Most of the debris comes from land because trash travels by way of inland waterways, storm drains, sewers, and is carried by the wind to eventually end up on the coast and in the ocean. Beach cleanups are a last line of defense in order to prevent debris from causing harm to our oceans, wildlife, to the coastal economies and to people who want to enjoy waterways.

Last year 66,844 volunteers throughout California picked up a total of 1,190,065 pounds of trash and recyclables. In Vallejo, 732 volunteers picked up more than 14,000 pounds of trash and recyclables. WHY COASTAL CLEANUP DAY IS IMPORTANT

When we look at the Pacific Ocean it looks clean and beautiful. However, there is an area of concentrated plastic pollution in the middle of the North Pacific gyre called the "Great Pacific Garbage Patch". This area of plastic debris, as well as other ocean areas around the world, are being studied to determine the effects of plastic trash on seabirds and marine life. Microscopic plastic particles in the ocean can be hard to see on the surface. Plastic trash in the ocean and waterways has been increasing since the 1960s and is a serious threat to birds and marine mammals.

Since 1960 to 2010 the percentage of plastic found in seabirds increased from 5 percent to 80 percent. New research estimates that by 2050 approximately 99 percent of seabirds will be consuming plastic. Birds have been found with ingested plastics such as twine, Styrofoam and candy wrappers, plastic pellets, etc. in their stomachs. In addition to being toxic, plastic interferes with a bird's ability to assimilate food and can puncture internal organs leading to death. Birds mistake plastic items for food and swallow them by accident. Plastic debris washes into the ocean from waste deposits, rivers and sewers.

Coastal Cleanup Day (CCC), Saturday, September 19, 2015 is our opportunity to prevent plastic trash and other debris from winding up in the ocean and endangering the creatures that rely on the ocean for food and habitat. Take time to volunteer and help reduce the amount of trash and litter going into oceans. Each plastic water bottle can take 450 years to decompose. Fishing lines and nets can take up to 600 years to decompose. Plastic bags or balloons in the ocean are dangerous (a sea turtle can mistake them for a jellyfish meal). On CCC you can help make the ocean a cleaner, safer habitat for seabirds and marine life.

According to the Monterey Bay Aquarium, globally, up to one million seabirds and 100,000 marine mammals and sea turtles die each year from eating plastic. Nearly 200 pieces of plastic were found in a single seabird.

What you can do to help reduce litter:

- Reduce use of disposable plastic products
- Reuse and recycle when possible
- Pick up litter and place in waste container.
- Use cloth grocery bags instead of plastic bags.
